## Nehemiah: Purpose and Theme

God used Nehemiah to help Judah rebuild the walls of Jerusalem and reorder/reform their lives.

Purpose—This book was written to describe God’s restoration of His people and encourage obedience to the covenant.

The theme of Nehemiah is Rebuilding the Wall and Reforming the People

### **Monday, Aug 21**

#### Read— **Nehemiah 9**

➔ Briefly, what is the chapter about? Where does it “fit” in the context and purpose of this book?

☞ In this prayer (vv. 5ff) what themes are repeated?

☞ Compare verses 8 and 32. What covenant did God make? With whom? For what? Did He keep it? How?

#### **Nehemiah 10**

➔ Briefly, what is the chapter about? Where does it “fit” in the context and purpose of this book?

☞ What do you think “a curse and an oath to walk in God’s law” (v. 29) refers to?

☞ The renewed commitment (v. 36) was to the Lord.

- ☞ Read and meditate on verse 15. God has *you* where you’re at right now for a reason. What is it?
- ☞ How much prayer do you read about in verse 16? Get a concordance and look up how many times “prayer” is mentioned in Esther.

## Esther 5

- ➔ Briefly, what is the chapter about? Where does it “fit” in the context and purpose of this book?
- ☞ The expression “to half of the kingdom” (v. 3) isn’t to be taken literally. What is his point by saying this?
- ☞ In verses 9–14, what was Haman like? What made him happy and satisfied?

## Wednesday, Aug 23

### Read— Nehemiah 13

- ☞ Note verses 4–5. Though the Ammonites were excluded they still influenced the Jews through compromising marriages. What application can you make from this?

- ☞ In verses 15 and following, how did the people disobey? What were the effects? How was it dealt with?

### Esther: Introductory Material

**Purpose**—Esther was written to encourage Israel that God will preserve them as a nation, no matter how far they fall from Him or how powerful the foes they face.

**Theme**—God’s providential care

**Key verses**—4:14; 6:13; 9:1

### Summary of Esther

Esther, a Jewess, hides her identity and becomes Queen of Persia. Together with her cousin Mordecai they enable Jews to defend themselves from ethnic cleansing. This book shows God’s faithfulness to His promises to the descendants of Abraham (Gen 12:3). If Haman’s plan succeeded, all Jews would have been wiped out. God made promises to Abraham and David, and Haman’s efforts in the book of Esther threatened their fulfillment. Esther teaches God’s providential care of Israel. No matter how bad things became, God is in control, His people are in His hands.

☞ *Esther shows God’s providential care for and protection of Israel.*

  - b. In Susa, 9:11–15

- 3) Mordecai’s greatness, 10

### **Esther 1**

➔ Briefly, what is the chapter about? Where does it “fit” in the context and purpose of this book?

- ☞ This book shows God’s providential care for and protection of Israel. Though by this time Jews had been returning to Jerusalem, these apparently did not.
- ☞ Imagine the scene in verses 5–7—decadent revelry for a half a year!
- ☞ So what did the king decide to do to Vashti and why (v. 19)?

### Items for Prayer

**Thursday, Aug 24**

### Read— **Esther 2**

➔ Briefly, what is the chapter about? Where does it “fit” in the context and purpose of this book?

- ☞ In verse 3, “harem” refers to a large group of women available to him. Is that a morally, upright situation? Why?
- ☞ Does Esther’s conduct in verses 8–16 sound like one who feared the Lord? (Compare Proverbs 31; Daniel 1:8)
- ☞ Mordecai “sitting at the king’s gate” (v. 21) shows that he had some type of official position in the government.
